Infant Bulletin

We currently have 9 infants in our Program ranging in ages 6 weeks to 16 months. Looking around our busy environment it is clear many of our infants are at different stages in their development. Each child is following his/her own schedule. Your child will reach certain milestones at their own pace.

According to Developmental Screening Tests, 90 percent of infants can:

- smile, roll over, and reach for an object by 5 months

- sit without support by 8 months
- pull to a standing position without anyone's help by 10 months
- walk on their own by 14 months
- by about 9 months, 75 percent can imitate speech sounds, say three words by 15 months, and put words together by about 22 months

The important thing to remember about these statistics is: They are used to help give you an idea of how your baby is developing. They are NOT exact. Today milestones take place over a whole range of "normal."

5 Things Toddlers DO Understand

1. They know what you're saying. Despite their inability to speak in full sentences, toddlers can understand a large number of words and commands. So meaningful comprehension can come several months before vocabulary catches up with it.

2. They sense what you're feeling. They don't understand why you are tense, but they pick up the signs and the meaning.

3. They recall routines down to the tiniest detail. A familiar sequence of events helps him/her feel secure. Alter it just a little and he/she is likely to protest.

4. They know how to empathize. When a friend is hurt, toddlers want to help or soothe others by imitating how they've been soothed by adults.

5. They know how to create a comfort object. Having a special blanket or doll helps make them feel calm and protected. This helps them feel better in an often scary or confusing world.

A few reminders: If you have not brought in a family photo for our tree, please bring one in. Home brought breakfast is served until 8:00am ONLY. Also, please keep home items, such as toys, at home.
